


# EASY UPDATES CHIC PENDANT LIGHTS GRAPHIC RUGS SMART INDOOR PLANTING

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amilies with young children usually live in supremely practical spaces. Yet Laura and John Chambers, who have five boys under the age of ten, chose to decorate their home with hand-painted panels, lacquered walls and fine furniture. "We had to be brave," admits Laura. "We could have plastic-coated the entire place, but instead we decided to live with beautiful things and encourage the boys to respect their surroundings."

Laura and John, a financial adviser, bought the New York apartment in 2009 as a home for themselves and James, now aged nine, Oliver, seven, and Robbie, five; Freddie, three, and five-month-old Harry arrived afterwards. The property sits on the seventh and eighth floors of a duplex that was designed by the celebrated architect James ER Carpenter in 1927. "His buildings are wonderful and have the prettiest sweeping staircases," says Laura. "We were keen to keep the look authentic while accommodating the needs of our sons."

To help strike this balance, the couple enlisted the help of architect Tom Felton and interior designer Ashley Whittaker, who is renowned for decorating in neo-classical style. "Ashley and I worked together at Ralph Lauren many years ago

"John and I really like her style – she had worked with us on our two previous homes."

Ashley's brief was to make the apartment "glamorous but child friendly", a task that began by eradicating a back staircase that would once have been used by domestic staff. "This, along with knocking together three tiny rooms, provided lots of space for a new kitchen and a useful butler's pantry," Ashley explains.

Most of the interior had been untouched since the 1920s and, although Ashley and Tom had to renovate some features, they remained faithful to the originals at every turn. When new materials were introduced, such as the wood-block flooring in the entrance hall, they blended in with ease.

Leading off this graceful hall is a series of formal, grown-up spaces including a sitting room, dining room and library, while the boys' bedrooms and playroom are grouped together on the floor above. "John and I felt it was important to have plenty of smart areas in which to entertain," says Laura. "Dividing the apartment like this was a beautifully practical solution."

All the rooms, for young and old alike, share a palette of bright colours ranging from fresh greens

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and sunny yellows to jewel-like blues and reds. "The apartment is filled with fun shades that give it a vibrant feel," says Laura. "They compensate for the fact that green views are rare in New York; using colour inside your home keeps you cheerful in the midst of the city."

Few of the spaces are decorated conventionally, though. "Instead of using plain paint, we dressed the surfaces with wallpapers, fabrics, lacquers and glazes," says Ashley. "Walls are my starting point in every scheme because, when they are treated like this, they make a house look properly decorated and

smartly finished." The walls-first approach works wonders in the library, where expanses of panelling and shelving have a finish as rich and glossy as melted chocolate, and in the dining room, where the red lacquered walls were a real labour of love. "Laura and John requested a red scheme, but this finish is incredibly deep and intense," says Ashley. "It took a very long time for the specialist painter to achieve this effect, but it is the perfect mood-setter."

The bedrooms have a softer look, courtesy of fabric wallcoverings; the walls of the main bedroom are lined with a small-scale pattern that cocoons the

Perhaps most exquisite is the wall treatment in the entrance hall, comprised of several bespoke panels that were individually designed and handpainted to fit the space. Each one has a delicate Chinoiserie pattern that sits precisely between the dado and the ceiling mouldings; its leaves and flowers meander around each arched doorway and even follow the gentle curves of the staircase.

Ashley also filled the rooms with newly sourced furniture. "We wanted to start from scratch, so that

the style, size and shape of each item would work perfectly in its surroundings," says Laura. "We thought that 1920s-style furniture would not have been soft enough, so instead we chose pieces from a variety of different periods that together strike the correct balance."

This sense of balance is very much in evidence throughout the apartment, which is every bit as comfortable as it is polished. And, as the children sit down for supper on an ikat-upholstered bench in the kitchen, it is clear that this interior is also compatible with the rigours of family life.

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
